### **From your County Councillor**

**Footpath from Station Yard to the centre of Tiddington** - by the time you see this newsletter, work should have been started, if not completed on the footpath which was part of the planning permission for the new housing estate. This will provide a safer passage, in particular for children walking to catch the school bus, but also for other pedestrians.

**Family friendly walks near you** - Oxfordshire County Council's Countryside Service has published a collection of short, easy walks in a new family-friendly format. The new walk maps are colourful and easy to read and identify local features such as wildlife and local attractions using cartoon-like icons. All the walks in the collection are under 1.5 miles and are intended to be accessible to both push chairs and wheelchairs. The new map format has been designed to be easy to read and appeal to families with young children, whilst still retaining accessibility information such as path widths and surfaces for those in wheelchairs. The new maps are much easier to read than the version that was previously available. It is hoped that they will encourage families with young children to make the most of these great areas of countryside for short walks and maybe also to try out one of the family activities while they are there. The walks are located across the county to ensure that everyone can try a walk in their own district and also have the opportunity to experience new areas of countryside further afield. They are located in a range of attractive and diverse landscapes including woodlands, meadows, nature reserves, rivers and lakes. **Fire and Rescue Service awarded for significant savings** - Oxfordshire County Council's Fire and Rescue Service has received an award for its project to improve the uniform for all nine fire and rescue services in the south east, saving £500,000 across the region. The project has made such significant savings that it is now being rolled out nationally

to more than half of the fire and rescue services in England.

## From your MP, John Howell

**John Howell MP writes...**

*A look back at key issues from Westminster and those raised from the Constituency in April 2011.*

**The Health and Social Care Bill** successfully completed its first stages in the House of Commons. In order to allow time to work through a number of issues which have been raised, the Secretary of State for Health announced that, having reached a natural break in the legislative process, there would be a pause in the process to allow concerns to be listened to and addressed. Where there are good suggestions to improve the legislation and the implementation of these plans, changes will be made. Nothing in the plans undermines the fundamental principle of the NHS: that it delivers care free to all, funded from general taxation, and based on need and not ability to pay.

The key proposals of this bill are to give GPs the task of commissioning the healthcare they deem appropriate for their patients, and control over a proportion of the NHS budget to pay for these services; to make the NHS accountable to patients and the public by establishing a new independent body to investigate complaints and scrutinise the performance of local health providers; to establish a new body to improve public health and reduce health inequalities between the richest and poorest; to cut the bureaucracy of the NHS by abolishing Primary Care Trusts (PCTs) and Strategic Health Authorities by 2013, reducing NHS management costs by 45%, and scrapping a number of arm's length bodies and quangos.

### **Update on Libya**

On 5 April the House debated humanitarian aid to Libya. The House heard that 2,100 tents from Britain's stores in Dubai had been

dispatched to help those displaced by the fighting, especially around Ajdabiya. The British taxpayer has also supported the International Committee of the Red Cross, which is providing basic necessities to 100,000 people displaced by the violence, and medical supplies and treatment to 3,000 people affected by the ongoing fighting in Libya. Britain is known across the world for the quality of its response to humanitarian disasters. That is matched by the generosity shown by British people when faced with the overwhelming need of others.

### **Unemployment in the Constituency**

Recent figures show that the number of people unemployed within the constituency has fallen. The figure for March, which is based on those claiming Job Seekers Allowance, was a total of 752 people, down 18 from the previous month. There are only four constituencies in the country which have a lower rate of unemployment. This Constituency continues to weather well the economic and financial situation in the country as a whole and it is good to see unemployment falling. 80% of our economy in the constituency comes from the private sector and whilst I am pleased to see the unemployment figures I am aware of the difficulties that many small and medium sized businesses are suffering. I am therefore fully behind initiatives to reduce unnecessary regulation and bureaucracy on business and employment. I was delighted to see over 6000 responses to the Government's "Red Tape Challenge" in the first few weeks of its launch. The next sector to be asked to comment during May is Hospitality, Food and Drink. I hope that many involved in this sector in the Constituency will make their suggestions. In June there will be an opportunity for those in Healthy living and Social care to put forward their suggestions. Other sectors are also included. ## The future of Pubs

I was pleased to be able to take part in the re-opening of the White Hart in Nettlebed last month. It is good to see a pub moving forward rather than closing and I share the concern expressed by many in the constituency about the future of pubs both locally and across the country. Thus I am pleased to be able to reassure you the Government is working to find constructive ways to support these local institutions. I am aware of fears over the level of competition within the pub sector and the impact of the "supply tie" on both consumers and publicans. Although in October last year the Office of Fair Trading found the pub sector to be competitive, Ministers continue to monitor the voluntary agreement within the industry to address concerns. Locally I am in touch with a number of landlords on local concerns.

*I am often asked questions about the workings of MPs and of Parliament. I try to answer one a month.*

Q. What is a parliamentary recess and why do they occur?

A. Few if any Parliaments legislate the whole year round. The periods when Parliament is not sitting are called Recesses although they should more accurately be described as adjournments. In recent years, there has been a tendency in the press inaccurately to try to characterise a Recess as a holiday. Members of Parliament are fully entitled to take holiday during the year and it is appropriate that they do so during the Recess rather than while Parliament is sitting. However, during the Recess, Parliament is not closed - it is merely that the legislative chambers and formal committees are adjourned. Members' offices normally remain open throughout and many Members continue to be in Parliament during this time on a frequent basis. Many also use

this as a time to undertake research, to have meetings in Parliament with organisations and constituents and to prepare for the legislative session ahead. Members also carry out their other roles in their constituencies during this time. The Recess is an opportunity to take a step back from the daily turmoil of debates, Bill committees, Select Committees, publications, reports and releases to do the deeper research and wider thinking that shapes policy.

### Mysticism for Today

"I cannot tell you how surprised I was the first time I felt my heart begin to warm. It was real warmth too, not imaginary, and it felt as if it were actually on fire. I was astonished at the way the heat surged up, and how this new sensation brought great and unexpected comfort. I had to keep feeling my breast to make sure there was no physical reason for it! But once I realised that it came entirely from within, that this fire of love had no cause, material or sinful, but was the gift of my Maker, I was absolutely delighted, and wanted my love to be greater."

These words, written by the fourteenth century English mystic, Richard Rolle still resonate with people today. They try to put into words an experience or encounter with the divine which goes beyond words and thoughts and can often only be known by its effects. Mystical prayer and those who have attempted to articulate it have increasingly fascinated our world of blogs and twitters. The idea that God can be known intimately within the silence of encounter draws those who would say they never went to church into a search for God.

The workshop on "Mysticism for Today" is just one of a number of events that will be taking place at the Festival of Prayer on 16 July. In it we will not only share our experiences of what Rolle called the "fire of love" but also plumb the depths of the vast body of mystical writings in order to seek guidance on how to discern and nurture this encounter. Whilst this workshop aims to deepen our own Christian search for God, it will also explore the extent to which the mystical aspects of other religions enable us to have a deeper understanding of other people's faith and devotion. It's not a place where you will find all

the answers but it will be an opportunity to explore and share your love of God.

This is the aim of the Festival of Prayer as a whole. Many people these days feel drawn to the spiritual rather than the religious and in recognition of this the Oxford Diocese and Bible Reading Fellowship present a day to enable you to explore different aspects of Christian Spirituality. It is being held at three venues within Cuddesdon including Ripon College, the Parish Church and Village Hall. Including the workshop on Mysticism which I shall be giving, the Cursillo Team will be talking about their movement to empower Christians through prayer, study and action. Sister Helen Julian, a Franciscan nun, will be explaining Franciscan prayer whilst Mary Crameri will look at prayer from the Benedictine tradition. Our keynote speaker is Ian Adam who is also holding a workshop on New Monasticism and a member of the Northumbrian Community will speak about how this is lived out today in a Celtic tradition. Along with workshops there will also be a chance to pray and reflect with prayer stations in the church and modern sacred art.

The whole day costs £20 in order to cover costs of travel and you can book a place through the BRF website on [www.brfonline.org.uk/festival-of-prayer](http://www.brfonline.org.uk/festival-of-prayer). We do hope you will take advantage of this wonderful day which has been put on for you and look forward to seeing you there.

## Waterstock & Tiddington W.I.



At our April meeting, Jan Warner gave a fascinating history of child rearing from the eighteenth century onwards, illustrating with antique items from her museum collection. It was certainly "survival of the fittest" as the title of her talk suggested.

In May, a member of Thame WI, Eva McDonnell, spoke of her experiences when she was evacuated from London to Somerset at the age of 6 just before the outbreak of World War 2. The rural area was to be her home for the next 6 years and she provided many atmospheric photographs of the time. These

graphic illustrations make for a great interest in the past, as do the archives of our own Institute, now over 80 years old. We are in process of gathering together all our archives and would be glad to receive any material relating to Waterstock and Tiddington WI (or Waterperry and Waterstock as it was called in 1924). I would be happy to collect or else please deliver to 24 Albury View.

Also in May the AGM Resolutions on the opposition to proposed mega farms and the closure of libraries were discussed and both carried.

### Ticket Scams

Many of us now buy tickets on the internet for all kinds of events, but it is important to be aware of certain issues before making an online purchase and to be confident the site is genuine. Researching the website that you are thinking of purchasing from can help determine its credibility.

For example it is imperative that every website has a full street address and a UK landline number, so this is definitely worth checking.

If you are still in doubt, don't be afraid to ask lots of questions before you make your purchase. You could ask:

When will the ticket be dispatched and how will you be notified? You should also find out what the company's policy on refunds is.

When paying for tickets online, always pay by credit card. Under the Consumer Credit Act, your card issuer is jointly liable for the failure to provide goods or services if the cash price of a single ticket is over £100.

If you believe that you have been a victim of a scam you can report the incident to the police and get a crime reference number. For further advice, call Consumer Direct on 08454 04 05 06 or visit their website [www.consumerdirect.gov.uk](http://www.consumerdirect.gov.uk) for information about The Just Tick It campaign.

### Tax Credits

If you've been getting **tax credits**, you should have received an annual review pack (called a **renewals pack**) from HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC).

Make sure you look at this pack and fill in any forms you need to as soon as possible - **the deadline is 31 July**. You must do this even if you are no longer getting any money or expect payments to end soon.

If you don't do this by 31 July:

- you may have to repay any money you've received since 6 April
- if you're still getting payments, these will stop.

HMRC need you to look at the pack so that they can work out how much your payments should be for the current tax year and make sure they paid you the right amount for the last tax year.

Read through the pack carefully to check that all the information about you is correct and whether you need to contact HMRC - you can

either do this by phone, or by sending your form back by post to the Tax Credit Office.

Sometimes it can be difficult to work out what information to put on the form. If you need help filling in the form, there are videos to help you. You can watch the videos online at: [www.direct.gov.uk](http://www.direct.gov.uk).

If you **don't** get anything about your tax credits, contact **the tax credit helpline** on **0845 300 3900**.

## **GREAT HASELEY AND DISTRICT HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY**

We have certainly seen unusual weather this spring with growth starting slowly and then accelerating in the unseasonably hot and dry weather. Many plants have been flowering several weeks ahead of their usual time. Wisteria sinensis along with Clematis Montana 'Elizabeth' peaked just before Easter around 20 April and the combined scent was magnificent. Each year these are followed by the heady scent of the tiny flowers of Elaeagnus 'Quicksilver'. Irises have peaked in the second week of May instead of the first week of June and roses are already blooming well (don't forget to give them a feed to help ensure further blooms later in the summer). This certainly makes planning for the garden to look good at a particular time more difficult, but I think gardens are for enjoying in the moment - it is easy to be too busy to take time out to enjoy just being. One advantage has been that the soil has warmed up more quickly than usual which allows earlier sowings of vegetable seeds, although we always have to be mindful of the late frosts which we are subject to in this part of the country. French beans are particularly sensitive to frost as we have found to our cost in previous years; last year we made

the decision never to sow them directly into the ground before 1 June, but we have brought forward that date by two weeks. I am also growing some in pots just in case!

My better half works very much by the Heath Robinson method in that he never throws anything away that might be useful. As a result of this we have a fruit cage made of old scaffolding poles and raised beds built from waste wood; a second 'man' greenhouse has been constructed out of old glass doors with the old shower door serving as the entrance. I think this is really a second shed for men to hide in as it is a long way from the house! When wheelie bins were introduced we were left with redundant dust bins. Last year we grew peas and beans in them and this year they contain carrots. Carrots are a particular problem in that the carrot root fly has an unerring ability to find carrots from a distance of many hundreds of yards. Reputedly they are able to fly only to a height of two feet above ground level and so should be unable to reach them in the dustbin. Last year we grew the carrots in an old bath (in the garden when we moved in), but there was some infestation there which I guess was a result of variation in flight height ability. Another way to protect your carrots is to cover them with fleece or enviromesh and simply prevent access; in my hands this is not very successful as the flies only have to be lucky once.

I have had my usual problem with my greenhouse being too hot to grow or germinate seedlings. It is in full sun and, although it sounds very easy when you read about it, shading it proves very difficult. I think if I were to choose a site for a greenhouse it would be partly shaded by deciduous trees which would give plenty of light in winter allowing successful overwintering of tender plants. This year for the first time I have bought mini plug plants by mail order and very cost effective and successful it has been; this is particularly the case for bedding plants which have expensive seed for any reason e.g. Zinnia

Magellan hybrids. I will definitely repeat this as my greenhouse seems to be well suited to bringing on small plants as opposed to seedlings.

On a final note, my seemingly dead, large *Pittasporum* has new shoots arising from the base so I am relieved we did not take it out earlier; this confirms the old wisdom of not giving up on plants until the end of May. Now we just need to cut it down and wait a few years...

**The Switchover to Digital Television is coming.....*A message for all viewers***

**This September, the analogue television signal will be switched off forever and replaced with a digital signal. Your TV equipment will need to be digital-compatible, otherwise you will not be able to watch TV!**

ORCC is working with Digital UK, a not for profit organisation formed by broadcasters, to assist Oxfordshire consumers in the conversion to **digital** TV. There are two Switchover dates for Oxfordshire. 14 September (BBC2) and 28 September (all remaining analogue channels - ITV, BBC1, Channel 4, Channel 5).

If you already have Freeview, Freesat, cable TV, or satellite TV you don't need to worry, you're already digital-compatible. If not, you'll have to convert your TV, which can be as easy as connecting a digital box to your existing TV. Equipment suitable for Switchover will be marked with the digital tick logo. Remember, *every* TV you want to watch after the Switchover will have to be converted.

The role of ORCC is to get the Switchover message out to everyone in Oxfordshire, rural or urban, with a particular focus on the elderly,

people with disabilities and those with English as a second language.

In addition, ORCC is spreading the message about the Switchover Helpscheme. This scheme will assist people to convert their TV to digital if they are aged 75 or over, get or could get Disability Living Allowance, Attendance Allowance, Constant Attendance Allowance or mobility supplement, have lived in a care home for six months or more, or are registered blind or partially sighted.

However, we don't yet know how much loan interest repayments will add to the cost. Currently cavity wall

and loft insulation cost under £100 each in some areas thanks to Council grants. The Energy Saving Trust estimates households can save £115 each year with cavity wall insulation. This is a remarkable return on investment.

Get insulation installed in 2011 and you'll benefit from a grant. Beyond March 2012, when energy supplier grants are up for review, this is much less certain. So, for householders with savings, no intention of moving home and no desire to pay interest on a loan, today's best offers arguably represent the *real* green deal.

## Newington Nurseries

### Ferns and Fronds

Ferns are one of the oldest groups of plants on earth, comprising some 12,000 species. Their life cycles differ from those of flowering plants and conifers as they produce spores as opposed to seeds. Ferns were at their most popular in the 'pteridomania' ('fern fever') period of the mid 19th century. The Victorians were avid collectors and ferns were no exception. Their popularity then waned but their fortunes have recently seen a resurgence, thanks in part to our interest in architectural plants. Despite their age of some 400 million years and their prehistoric appearance, their form and shape suit today's contemporary garden.

Although ferns are usually grown in shady positions or woodland settings, there are those that are happy to grow in sun, in sand, on rock and in water. Terrestrial ferns prefer to be planted in open and free-draining soil as this suits their fibrous root system. Incorporating well-rotted compost or leaf mould on an annual basis around the plant is more than sufficient for the fern's needs. Fertilizer is unnecessary as ferns do not need additional energy for the production of flowers or seeds. In fact, fertilizers can cause ferns to die back so avoid using these products.

Ferns are tough and resilient plants. If the fronds shrivel during dry weather or are damaged during cold weather, new fronds will develop later the same year or early the following year. The fronds of deciduous ferns can be trimmed from the plant when they start to turn yellow during autumn or early winter. Older fronds of evergreen ferns can be removed in spring just as the new fronds are beginning to emerge.

Although the majority of ferns prefer shade, there are some that do well in sun, particularly *Blechnum chilense* or *Dryopteris cycadina* AGM. Once planted, ferns prefer to be left alone to mature and spread. Do not divide as this will inhibit their growth.

Below is a small selection of tough and hardy outdoor ferns that suit our climate:

***Athyrium filix-femina* AGM** (Lady Fern), native to the British Isles, is a tall, upright, deciduous species that will get to a height of 1.2 metres. It's one of the most attractive resident ferns and has many cultivated varieties such as 'Frizelliae' and 'Lady in Red'. Its preferred planting situation is a shady position or a woodland setting in moist soil conditions.

***Athyrium niponicum* var. *pictum* AGM** (Japanese Painted Fern) is native to Japan, China, Korea and Taiwan and gets to a height of around 40cm. It has bipinnate (feather-like) fronds, silver/grey/green in colour and mauve midribs. This deciduous fern likes moist soil conditions, shade or semi-shade and tolerates a minimum temperature -15°C. Again, there are many cultivars including 'Burgundy Lace' and 'Ursula's Red'.

***Blechnum chilense*** (Chilean Hard Fern) is a large fern, growing up to 1.2 metres in height and has leathery, matt green fronds that are deep red when young. This evergreen fern likes moist soil conditions and tolerates a minimum temperature -15°C. It can be planted in either full shade or full sun and is best sited in a protected area of the garden.

***Dryopteris filix-mas* AGM** (Male Fern) is a hardy British native that will grow to around 90cm in height. It has elegant but fairly robust foliage and is able to cope with a sunnier site and drier soil conditions than most hardy ferns. It's classified as deciduous but in mild climates, the foliage may remain all winter. It has a lovely shuttle-cock habit and the fronds turn a coppery colour in autumn.
